SEATTLE ARTS & LECTURES ANNOUNCES 2018/19 SEASON FEATURING ALICE WALKER, BARBARA KINGSOLVER, VAN JONES, & MORE!

Seattle, WA – MAY 8, 2018: Yesterday evening, Seattle Arts & Lectures (SAL) announced the headliners of the 2018/19 Season at the closing event for this year's Literary Arts Series with author Viet Thanh Nguyen. The upcoming season will be the first in SAL's history to feature a Literary Arts Series made up of entirely female writers. Subscriptions for the 2018/19 Literary Arts Series and SAL's new journalism series (title TBD) are on sale now. Women You Need to Know (WYNK) subscriptions will go on sale May 15. Poetry Series subscriptions will go on sale May 21. Create-Your-Own subscriptions will go on sale June 18, and single tickets will go on sale July 16.

SAL's Associate Director and program curator, Rebecca Hoogs, said, "This season, we wanted to respond to the moment and the many movements shaping our national discourse. Through story, language, and conversation we can cross the bridges that divide us. A few highlights of our 2018/19 Season include:

- Doris Kearns Goodwin will join us in October to kick off a Literary Arts Series devoted, for the first-time ever, to female writers and perspectives.
- a new three-part journalism series curated by Timothy Egan and Sam Howe Verhovek which gives the mic to journalists and protectors of free press
- our Poetry Series which will move to a new, more accessible home in the heart of Capitol Hill on the campus of Seattle Central Community College.
- expanding our Student ticket level to include ages 25 and under. This new "Student/Under 25" price point will be available for subscriptions and single tickets to full-time students at any age and anyone age 25 or under with a valid ID."

The <u>Literary Arts Series</u> presents original talks with the leading fiction and non-fiction writers of our time. The 2018/19 Literary Arts Series will feature a line-up of all female writers.

 Doris Kearns Goodwin Monday, October 1, 2018

Goodwin is a world-renowned presidential historian, public speaker, and Pulitzer Prize-winning author. She will speak on her forthcoming book, *Leadership in Turbulent Times*, which will explore presidential leadership throughout history. Kingsolver is a renowned American novelist and author of the instant classics *Flight Behavior, The Poisonwood Bible, The Lacuna*, and *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle*. She will speak about her life in reading and writing, as well as her forthcoming novel, *Unsheltered*.

Valeria Luiselli

Luiselli is an award-winning Mexican author living in the United States. She is the author of a book of essays, *Sidewalks*, and two novels—*Faces in the Crowd* and *The Story of My Teeth*—which was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award and the Best Translated Book Award, and won the *Los Angeles Times* Prize for Best Fiction. Her most recent book, *Tell Me How It Ends: An Essay in 40 Questions*, was described by the *Texas Observer* as "the First Must-Read Book of the Trump Era."

Tayari Jones

Tuesday, May 14, 2019

Tayari Jones is the author of four novels, including *An American Marriage* which is about an African-American couple whose lives are shaken when the husband is incarcerated for a crime he did not commit. This event will feature a Q&A with Lisa Lucas, the Executive Director of the National Book Foundation.

Alice Walker

Thursday, October 4, 2018

S. Mark Taper Foundation Auditorium, Benaroya Hall

Walker is one of the United States' preeminent writers: an award-winning author of novels, stories, essays, and poetry. In 1983, Walker became the first African-American woman to win a Pulitzer Prize for fiction with her novel *The Color Purple*, which also won the National Book Award. Walker will read from her new collection of poetry, *Taking the Arrow Out of the Heart*.

Solmaz Sharif

Monday, February 11, 2019 Broadway Performance Hall

Sharif was born in Istanbul to Iranian parents. Her debut collection *LOOK* (Graywolf Press) was a finalist for the 2016 National Book Award and 2017 PEN Open Book Award. In *LOOK*, Sharif recounts some of her family's experiences with exile and immigration in the aftermath of warfare—including living under surveillance and in detention in the United States.

Ilya Kaminsky Monday, April 1, 2019 Broadway Performance Hall

Kaminsky was born in Odessa, in the former Soviet Union in 1977, and arrived to the United States in 1993, when his family was granted asylum. Ilya is the author of *Dancing in Odessa*, and his forthcoming book, *Deaf Republic*, deals both with Russia and his own hearing loss.

Eco-Poetics (Title TBD) Thursday, April 25, 2019 Broadway Performance Hall

This event will celebrate Earth Day and National Poetry Month, in collaboration with a new eco-poetics anthology from Copper Canyon Press.

Jericho Brown Tuesday, May 21, 2019 in collaboration with Copper Canyon Press Broadway Performance Hall

Brown is the author of three books of poetry, including *Please, The New Testament,* and a forthcoming collection with Copper Canyon Press. His work deals with race, masculinity, and sexuality, often through the lens of the Bible.

Each Moth Mainstage features simple, old-fashioned storytelling by five wildly divergent raconteurs who develop and shape their stories with The Moth's directors. Theme and storytellers to be announced in the spring of 2019.

Jones is a regular CNN contributor and host of *The Van Jones Show*. He is a co-founder of several nonprofit organizations, including the Dream Corps, a "social justice accelerator." He served as President Barack Obama's Special Advisor for Green Jobs, as a distinguished visiting fellow at Princeton University, and as a co-host of CNN 's political debate show *Crossfire*. This will highlight the paperback release of Jones' recent book, *Beyond the Messy Truth: How We Came Apart, How We Come Together*. All ticket holders (except Student) will receive copies of Jones' latest book.

Dean Baquet & Marty Baron in Conversation Tuesday, March 5, 2019

Baquet is the executive editor of the *New York Times* and a winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Investigative Journalism. He is the first black editor of the *New York Times*. Baron is the editor of the *Washington Post* and was previously the editor of the *Boston Globe*. The two editors will talk about the state of journalism, their respective papers, and the intersection of media and politics.

Jill Lepore Friday, October 12, 2018 Illsley Ball Nordstrom Recital Hall, Benaroya Hall

Lepore is an award-winning historian at Harvard University, a staff writer for *The New Yorker*, and the author of ten previous books including *The Secret History of Wonder Woman*. In her new book, *These Truths: A History of the United States*, Lepore offers a magisterial account of the origins and rise of a divided nation.
