SEATTLE ARTS & LECTURES ANNOUNCES 2019/20 YOUTH POET LAUREATE WEI-WEI LEE TO PUBLISH HER FIRST BOOK ON JUNE 9, 2020

An online book launch will include a reading from Lee's newly released book, along with readings from the incoming Youth Poet Laureate and YPL Cohort

Seattle, WA—MAY 27, 2020: Seattle Arts & Lectures announces that the 2019/20 Youth Poet Laureate, Wei-Wei Lee, will publish her first collection, *In the Footsteps of a Thousand Griefs*, on June 9, 2020. Poetry NW Editions is the publisher. Wei-Wei will read from the book, along with members of the incoming 2020/21 Youth Poet Laureate (YPL) Cohort, in a pre-recorded online event on June 9, at 6 PM (PDT) at lectures.org. The event will also feature the unveiling of the 2020/21 Youth Poet Laureate. The event will feature a conversation between co-founders of the Seattle Youth Poet Laureate Program, mentors Aaron Counts and Matt Gano, along with Wei-Wei, as well as readings from the incoming 2020/21 YPL Cohort. Wei-Wei Lee's poetry collection will be available for presale at Open Books: A Poem Emporium and Elliott Bay Book Company beginning June 1, 2020.

In a time of uncertainty, Wei-Wei Lee's debut poetry collection invites us to join her in her vulnerability, and partake in the forming of bonds between ourselves and the ever-evolving stories amidst our time and place. *In the Footsteps of a Thousand Griefs* asks us what it means to call a place home, and then cherishes the small things that silently root in us all until we are all surrounded by an abundance of beauty.

Wei-Wei Lee was born in San Gabriel, California, but grew up one ocean away in Zhongli District, Taoyuan, Taiwan. She is a senior at Nathan Hale High School. Lee has been stateside for four years, and Seattle is the first U.S. city, she says, that she has ever known and loved. For her, poetry holds its beauty in language

that comes from pure feeling and imagery. She set out to pay tribute to Taiwan and America in her work and, as she has said, "hopes [she] duly honored both."

Claudia Castro Luna, Washington State Poet Laureate, writes: "Wei-Wei's poems from *In the Footsteps of a Thousand Griefs* work like concentric circles. The first poems in the collection fill our senses with the cacophony of life in the big city: the screech of cars, the waft of foods prepared by street vendors, the indifference of a passersby. As the book advances the poems move us inward and we walk alongside the poet, her feet on the streets of Seattle, her heart longing for a country, for dear relatives, for a language and ways of being lost to exile. 'Maybe desperation has its own tone' the poet writes and goes on to render for us the intimate sounds of her experience."

The 2020/21 Youth Poet Laureate mentors will be Laura Da' and Arianne True. Laura Da' is a poet and teacher. A lifetime resident of the Pacific Northwest, Da' studied creative writing at the University of Washington and The Institute of American Indian Arts. Da' is Eastern Shawnee. Her first book, *Tributaries*, won the American Book Award. Da' lives near Seattle with her husband and son. Her newest book is *Instruments of the True Measure*. Arianne True (Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations) is a poet, teacher, and excitable human from right here in Seattle. Arianne has more than a decade of experience working with youth of all ages, and has taught and performed everywhere from the temperate rainforest canopy to under Seattle's streets, from the intertidal zone to the deck of a tall ship. Arianne is a proud alum of Hedgebrook and of the MFA program at the Institute of American Indian Arts.
